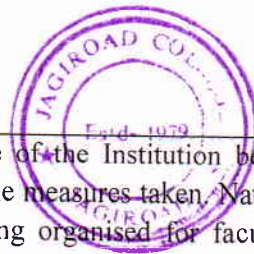
6.1.2 Does the institution have a Management Information System (MIS)? Yes/No/Partial:

The College started its student records keeping through a software prepared by a Local Party in which students admission related information are maintained. So, only admitted students information are being accessed through this software. In the coming session online admission process will be started. Complete MIS is yet to be included in the College, mainly due the shortage of staff and fund required for that. It is expected that in the coming days, the complete management information system will be incorporated in the college.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):

- ❖ Curriculum Development : College follows curriculum prepared and finalised by the University, so there is little scope to develop curriculum of traditional courses. But few Faculties of different departments of the College took part at the initial stages of introduction of semester system as the member of Under Graduate Syllabus Committee. For skilling courses such as B.Voc and Community College Courses, our College took active participation in preparing the syllabi. The Syllabi of B.Voc. Acting were prepared by our Faculties. B.Voc. Retail Management syllabi and Community College Fashion Technology syllabi were prepared in consultation with Industry partner XIMIT. The syllabi for Pulp and Paper Technology were prepared in close consultation with the Industry partner Nagaon paper Mill of HPCL.
- ❖ Teaching and Learning: The back bone of every Academic Institution is the process of Teaching Learning. College takes regular measure for enhancement of competency of faculties so as to effective curriculum transaction in the classes. Timely actions are being undertaken by organising special FDP for the purpose mentioned above.
- ❖ Examination and Evaluation: This is another vital area through which an academic institution is judged. Examinations are conducted taking utmost care by involving faculties and other support staff of the College. The College evaluates students through both internal as well external examination processes. Internal Sessional, Terminal and Test examinations are conducted by the examination committee constituted for the purpose and evaluated results are shown to the students and displayed in the departmental notice board.
- ❖ Research and Development: Research and Development is a contentious process through which qualities of Faculties of an Institution judged. Since UGC has not invited proposal for MRP last year, so there is no UGC Research project this year. Other research funding agencies are not approached by the faculties. The College resolved to apply for DBT fund and now it is under process, hoped to be received next year.
- ❖ Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation: Library resources, particularly procurement of Books and Journals are done every year subject to the availability of funds and requirements of different departments. Physical Infrastructure and Instrumentations also depend on fund. This year no expansion of physical takes place but in the next year a number of projects are undertaken. Introduction of additional Instruments will also to be processed in the next session.



❖	Human Resource Management: The management treat every human as resource of the Institution be it a Faculty, management staff, or student. So, for all-round development, every possible measures taken, National Seminars, Workshops and FDP on Teaching Learning, and use of ICT are being organised for faculties. Motivational session arranged for Students of all the streams. On Job Training arranged for skilling students. Office staff are also counted and discussed with them, listen their grievances and takes all possible measures within its limitations.
❖	Industry Interaction / Collaboration: Perhaps we are the first college (in comparison to our types of affiliating govt. provincialised Colleges) taking pro-active role in Industry collaboration. Our each and every skilling students are being provided industry support to enhance their learning outcomes. For this a number of MoUs signed with Industries and Business Establishments such as Big Bazar, Pentaloon, People, Bata India, Entertainment Channels like Rong, Rengoni, Jonak, Prag, News Time etc and evet with Dr. Bhupen Hazarika Institute of Film and Television Institute, Arohan, XIMIT and other Industries like Nagaon paper Mill, Fashion Technology Institutes etc. On Job Training of two months duration are arranged for these skilling students. Students from Masters of Tourism Course have also been providing industry exposure in Tourism Industries.
❖	Admission of Students : Merit based admission into different programmes are strictly followed maintaining Roster. Earlier a handsome number of poor family students were provided funds from the College, but this year limited to only 13 students. This is because the Assam Govt. has adopted free admission policy for families whose annual income is less than 1 lakh.
6.2.2	:Implementation of e-governance in areas of operations:
❖	Planning and Development : The College is planning to introduce MIS in coming days. So, at present it is only limited to students admission record maintenance.
❖	Administration: The College management always takes lead role in providing better facilities to all its Faculties, support Staff and students. For this, extra efforts have been taken to enhance physical facilities. During last five years, the College witnessed expansions in various fronts, expanded in every aspects, be it infrastructure, students enrolment, introduction of new subjects/streams, appointment of new faculties and other support staff. On behalf of the Governing Body, the Principal has been playing pro-active role to facilitate all these activities. Establishment of Industry linkage, signing of MoUs with Industries, On Job Training (OJT) to Students, physical facilities enhancement, round the clock water supply through deep boring, clean drinking water facilities to the Hostel Boarders and continuous power supply etc are provided under his initiatives. Solar Power installation in the campus is one of the energy conservation measure undertaken. Student support system such as Students Health Insurance, Bank Literacy by opening bank account, enrolment in PAN card, self defence for both Boys and Girls, special initiative to facilitate sports and cultural activities are a few to mention. The College witnessed its own Sports fields during the last two years which were a distant dream in earlier days. Faculty enrichment programmes are also undertaken by organising different FDPs. The College takes active participation in data submission to AISHE portal in a timely manner. The College also going to take part NIRF ranking process. This year, the College participated MDRA India Today College Ranking.
❖	Finance and Accounts: The College maintained its accounts and Internal Audit done regularly through GB appointed CA. Internal fund flow and out going funds are all in the recorded forms. No cash transactions or self withdrawal done during the last five six years. All incoming fees from students are collected through bank challan with students counter foil. All funds are registered in PFMS portal and GST registration done.
❖	Student Admission and Support : As mentioned admission process is completed strictly on merit basis and following reservation of quota for different casts. Poor Students are supported financially from the College fund. Online form filling and payment of admission fees started from the session 2018-19.
❖	Examination : Examinations are being done on offline basis as per the University norms. The Gauhati University stared its online form filling processes since 2016 and this year issue of admit cards and semester end mark sheets through its web portal.

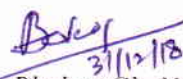
